In 2023, we also recognise the visible presence of MPs at the APPGM-SDG local events as well as during the conferences, capacity building and partnership meetings, with MPs taking a led in these initiatives. These are documented in this Annual Report.

We have established formal contacts with four parliamentary groups who play a role in mobilising MPs in SDGs at the international level. These are the Inter-Parliamentary Union (IPU), the Commonwealth Parliamentary Association (CPA), Parliamentarians for the Global Goals (PfGG) and Parliamentarians for Global Action (PGA). These four groups have been playing a key role in linking MPs with the UN on SDGs. We are exploring ways to ensure that Malaysian MPs are active at the international level as they are now at the local level.


In this 2023 Annual Report, we document 26 local issues identified through the mapping visits at the constituency level. Among the major concerns are poverty, access to welfare assistance and how to improve incomes and quality of life in both rural and urban locations including the difficulties experienced by people with disabilities and their family members.

Our findings are based on the sharings of locals, documented during the focus group discussions. There is an urgent need for all agencies to undertake similar exercises to listen to the ground issues at the grassroots. It is also important to establish local policy solution teams which encompasses a local SDGs taskforce. MPs must be included in all these discussions to find lasting solutions to the local problems and issues. Strengthening people's participation through grassroots democracy is the best way forward.

I am delighted and honoured to be invited to pen a brief foreword for the 2023 Annual Report of the All-Party Parliamentary Group Malaysia on the Sustainable Development Goals (APPGM-SDG). Globally, the United Nations has long championed the role of parliamentarians in drawing on the SDGs to frame policies and guide national strategies, oversee the budget process, but crucially also to drive local delivery efforts. The UN Country Team in Malaysia has enjoyed a long and fruitful partnership with the APPGM-SDG precisely on this agenda, and it has come to represent a best practice example of SDG localisation within the wider region as well as globally.

Comprising members from different political parties, the APPGM-SDG offers a vital mechanism for assessing localities' SDG needs, establishing priorities, and then offering project-based funding. It is an innovative Malaysian model built on social cohesion and unity between peoples. It brings together parliamentarians with often divergent views, and offers expert analysis at the local level, not to direct and govern, but to consult, listen, and help frame the SDG priorities for action. Additionally, the APPGM-SDG has an impact at the policy level, offering a mechanism for upward feedback and the trailing of salient topics and developments with federal and state decision makers.

A quick review of this Annual Report underlines that the APPGM-SDG had an exceptionally busy year. Indeed, 2023 marks the first in full year of the Group's reestablished Committee following Malaysia's 15th general election and the political developments since 2018. Its work has focused on the ramping up of assessment and delivery capacities, with the Group now active at 85 locations spanning all 16 states and territories, including Sabah and Sarawak.

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I specifically recognise and commend its governance approach as an exemplar for others. Participating parliamentarians act as part convenor and part overseer. They represent a focal point through which local actors, often from an array of official agencies and interests, are brought together, and they offer stewardship and validation of the process. Local mapping and assessment exercises are provided independently by the Secretariat working with local stakeholders. Local needs and projects are then identified, without fear or favour, and with a clear focus on equity and inclusion. This highly structured approach lends rigor and credibility to the APPGM-SDG, ensuring that it has become part of Malaysia's core SDG delivery architecture and afforded the Group considerable authority within policymaking circles.

This year is pivotal for the SDGs as it marks the halfway point to 2030, and progress assessments from all levels have indicated that very significant performance gaps remain. While analysis suggests that Malaysia has and is faring better than others, it too faces several SDG challenges. Many of these are associated "last mile" requirements of meeting first world standards of services and environmental protection, but there are also other challenges related to delivering good governance and ensuring no one and no community is left behind. Clearly, the SDG localisation agenda is a vital part of the required solutions, and APPGM's work has become increasingly salient to Malaysia's overall efforts to deliver the goals. As we move into 2024, the UNCT in Malaysia looks forward to an expanded and deeper cooperation with our friends and partners at the APPGM-SDG.

We are now reporting year four (2023) of localising the SDGs agenda in Malaysia with parliamentarians as the champions of SDGs. We have now recruited 85 Members of Parliament (MPs) between 2020 and 2023. A number of these MPs changed between the 14th and 15th Parliament, nonetheless we have received good support from all of them.

It is significant to note that there are three resolutions (A/RES/76/270, A/RES/72/278 and A/RES/77/159) adopted by the UN General Assembly on the role of parliaments and parliamentarians in the implementation of the SDGs at the international, national, and local levels. While the socio-economic development agenda is primarily seen as the responsibility of the State, different branches of the governance institutions have distinctive roles. This singling out of the parliaments and parliamentarians through UN General Assembly resolutions is very significant as there is recognition for distinctive roles and contributions of the legislative bodies in member states.

In this context and in line with SDG 17, Malaysia too has adopted a multi-stakeholder engagement process. The APPGM-SDG's activities in 2023 enhance this approach. We received excellent support from the district office in 2023 in various locations. In 26 out of 28 locations, the SDG inter-agency discussions were chaired by a District Officer (DO) or an Assistant District Officer (ADO). This is significant for the localising of SDGs at the ground level and the networking with district-level agencies, both Federal and State agencies operating at the local level.

We also saw a tremendous increase in SDG solution providers. In 2023, we recruited 364 of them, who are the main army of SDG workers in economic, social, and environmental projects. About 44% of these organisations are registered with the Registrar of Societies, therefore being voluntary or civil society organisations.

In a similar way, the partners from universities also increased with 52 academics from 15 universities, both public and private, playing a role in undertaking impact evaluation.

Our achievements and challenges in 2023 are documented in the various reports and pictorial presentations in this Annual Report. We have consolidated and accelerated the implementation of SDGs at the grassroots.

We recognise the hard work of our APPGM-SDG committee who met 26 times in 2023 to make decisions, especially on the funds allocated for solution projects and community farming. The leadership was provided by the APPGM-SDG Chair, Hon. Isnaraissah Munirah Majilis, with their support of all the committee members.

As Head of the Secretariat, I am indebted to the APPGM-SDG Secretariat, especially the 37 staff team members. A special word of appreciation to the Senior Director Puan Rahmah Othman and all the Directors (Anthony Tan, James Ryan Raj, Dr Teo Sue Ann, and Zoel Ng), Assistant Directors, and Executive Officers for their leadership role. Also, to all staff for playing a key role in ensuring we reach the targets and deliverables in localising the SDGs, thank you for all your hard work and dedication.

Thanks also to all the solution providers, the resource persons and those reviewing project proposals, and all the academics involved in the evaluation of SDG projects through the Malaysian Social Science Association (PSSM). Appreciation is also due to the exco members of the Society for the Promotion of SDGs and all partnering CSOs including the Malaysian CSO-SDG Alliance.





MAJOR THRUSTS & THE SECRETARIAT

Fourth Year in Localising SDGs

When we started as a small team of activists and academics with the formation of the APPGM-SDG in October 2019, we did not realise that we would receive so much support from the Speaker and Members of Parliament (MPs) – 85 by 2023 and from the 14th Parliament (2018 to October 2022) into the 15th Parliament (December 2022-present). This includes the support of agencies especially the Ministry of Economy and Ministry of Finance, as well as other agencies at the Federal, State, and local government levels. Our partnerships have grown and now include hundreds of local communities, solution providers, academics, and CSO-NGO activists. It is and has been an amazing journey. From a secretariat perspective, we can identify ten major trends: -

Trend 1: APPGM-SDG into the 15th Parliament with a new leadership of MPs

The first session of the 15th Parliament took place on 19 and 20 December 2022. During this period, the Secretariat met up with several MPs to secure their support. Hon. Isnaraissah Munirah Majilis and Hon. Dato' Sri Saifuddin Abdullah agreed to take the lead. We managed to form a pro-term Committee with the support of nine MPs.

On 21 March 2023, the Parliament announced the establishment of the APPGMs. The Secretariat submitted an application, signed by Hon. Isnaraissah Munirah Majilis and received the official approval from the Secretary of Parliament. There have been some changes in the line up of MPs in the Committee and this report provides the details. There is a very strong bipartisan commitment between MPs from both the government and opposition in the localising of the SDGs.

The Committee was very active in 2023 as there were weekly meetings towards the end of the year to approve all the SDG solution project applications. There were a total of 26 Committee meetings in 2023. A major number of meetings were held online.

There was a greater visibility of MPs at the APPGM-SDG functions such as book and report launches, at workshops and conferences, at dialogues with researchers at mapping exercises and field visits. MPs also made visits to solution projects at the local level.

Trend 2: Expansion of localising the SDGs mandate with injection of additional funding

Our 2023 work tasks increased with the injection of additional funds, not just for the localising of SDGs at the parliamentary level but also additional funds to work with grassroots communities for community farms. In 2022, Ministry of Finance (MoF) requested APPGM SDG to use its ground network and implement the Community Farms or *Kebun Komuniti* projects with local communities. MoF allocated an additional RM10 million. allocated RM10 million, and in 2023, this was increased 100% to RM20 million for localising the SDGs. As a result, there is an expansion of grassroots solution projects as reflected in this report.

A significant development emerged in early 2023 when MoF requested APPGM-SDG to use its ground network and implement the Community Farms or *Kebun Komuniti* project with local communities. MoF allocated an additional RM10 million. This report highlights the strategies adopted to undertake about 200 additional community farm projects. The Secretariat had to recruit new staff to undertake these new duties. The additional funds allocated reflected that the MoF was happy with the APPGM-SDG delivery of the solution project at the grassroots. The Secretariat was under pressure to deliver on expectations and also maintain good governance and accountability. The staff team has worked hard and well to realise the targets.

Trend 3: Consolidation of grounded research methodology

Since 2020, we have pilot tested the mapping of local issues through focus group discussions, field visits and dialogues with both local people and agencies at the district level. We recorded the discussions with permission, and transcribed the recordings to document the views as well as identify similar and differing views. There is a very strong commitment to grounded research methodology.

In 2023, we have undertaken the mapping exercise in 28 parliamentary constituencies, of which 50% are those of MPs linked to the government parties and the balance from opposition-based parties. We also visited Tambun, the constituency of the Prime Minister; as well as Pontian, the constituency of the Deputy Finance Minister.

The MySDG Center for Social Inclusion (MySDG CSI) seeks to work with the Secretariat constituency researchers and resource persons to also undertake situation analyses on a thematic basis across the many parliamentary constituencies.

By end of 2023, the Secretariat secured the mandate of the committee to undertake six special research projects as summarised in Table 1.1. This is an important component of our methodology, as we are undertaking evidence-based policy advocacy. The MySDG CSI provides the leadership and guidelines, and much of the work is commissioned to academics and solution providers.

These action research have a multi-dimensional focus, with an analyses based on the SDGs and policy recommendations for addressing the root causes and ensuring an effective solution to the issues and needs identified. This particularly involves addressing poverty and inequalities, with a focus on exploring the influence of ethnicity and culture towards finding long-term solutions. Hence, we are taking on specific ethnic studies as the communities differ in the deprivations experienced. These are in-depth ethnographic studies leading to policy dialogues and advocacy.

Trend 4: Increased support of district offices and agencies

When we first started in 2020, many at the district level did not know of APPGM nor the SDGs. With the intervention of Economic Planning Unit (EPU) in creating awareness via State government secretaries as well through State level economic planning units in 2021 and 2022, the situation changed, resulting in increased cooperation.

Based on our records, in 26 of the 28 districts visited in 2023, the District Officer (DO) or an Assistant DO (ADO) chaired the inter-agency meetings. At the pre-field visit discussions, 20 out of 28 DO or ADO chaired the meeting. This is a major step forward in securing the partnership and participation of Federal and State-based agencies. These meetings enabled us to secure the cooperation for long-term solutions of some of the local issues.

This is a proactive approach and enhancing the partnership model at the district level. The APPGM-SDG has begun exploring pilot testing of district level SDG committees. We have undertaken this in addressing welfare needs and issues. We first met the Minister of Women, Family and Community Development, Hon. Dato' Sri Hajah Nancy Shukri on 13 April 2023 and shared our findings from the ground on welfare-related concerns. This was followed with a meeting with the Ministry officials which resulted in the proposal to set up three pilot interventions namely Kubang Pasu, Seberang Perai and Kepong. One in a rural area, another a semi-urban area and the final one in an urban location.

Trend 5: Enlarging the policy research output through analyses and publications

2023 saw many books and reports launched as detailed in Table 1.2. This is our contribution to the development of knowledge base on SDG policies and programmes in Malaysia. Our team has a unique opportunity through the field visits and grounded research to draw out policy research concerns. We have also enlisted individuals with postgraduate qualifications in the staff team, of whom, six are PhD holders.

We have been publishing Annual Reports since 2021. We have released the 2020, 2021 and 2022 Annual Reports with an audited statement from our external auditors. These reports are also published in the Parliament website. Copies are placed on the table of every Member of Parliament, with the permission of Parliament officials. It is a good example of public accountability for the mandate and public funds released to us.

During the year, we published the 2022 Annual Report and seven books. Three publications are related to the mapping exercise. This includes a book of situational analyses edited by Dr Alizan Mahadi and Assoc. Prof. Dr. Zainal Abidin Sanusi, as well as two edited works of Dr Teo Sue Ann from the 2022 mapping exercises and situational analysis. They are all cross-cutting in nature to SDGs and parliamentary constituencies. These are useful for policy advocacy and dialogue among the agencies.

Two publications edited by James Ryan Raj and Paniirselvam Jayaraman focuses on solution projects and another by Prof. Dato' Dr. Rashila Ramli and Prof. Dr. Sity Daud on an impact assessment of the 2020 solution projects. From the beginning, we decided that external evaluators must make an independent assessments of the solution projects. The impact assessment enhances the delivery and monitoring of the local projects undertaken.

A major extension of SDG ideas shared is documented as the 2022 SDG Conference proceedings which is a record of 42 papers. Another book edited by Dr Teo Kee Len and Debbie Loh is entitled "SDG Policies and Practices in Malaysia" are 16 selected articles from the 2022 conference, rewritten and edited for publication. These also expands the knowledge base on SDGs.

Trend 6: Explosion of local SDG micro-solution projects

Micro-solution projects are a major component of localising the SDGs. Between 2020 and 2022, we funded 321 solution projects, however, in 2023 alone, we reached a total of 543 projects including community farm projects. We saw a tremendous increase between 2022 and 2023, with a jump of 69% equivalent to 222 solution projects. Cumulatively, there has been a total of 864 solution projects over the past 4 years (2020-2023). This is an impressive number of SDG-related micro-solution projects at the grassroots.

In 2023, with the injection of more funds for localising SDG projects, we made allocations for 508 solution projects through seven different grants, as shown in Table 1.3. However, by the end of 2023, a total of 543 solution projects had been approved by the APPGM-SDG Committee. We exceeded the target by 35 solution projects. This is a major success in the identification and processing of these grants by the staff team and the eventual approval by the committee of MPs.

Of the seven grants in 2023, three are constituency-based (Phase 1 to Phase 3) among the 85 parliamentary constituencies. The four other funds are additional funds provided by MoF to reach grassroots communities. We began to give emphasis to community learning centres, which are a follow-through from the initial constituency-funded projects that are doing well. We had many requests for income generation projects so these funds were allocated to fund an additional 100 projects.

We decided to follow through on at least 10 projects and provide them with a larger grant of RM100,000 each, based on their deliverables and potential for scalability. This is in recognition of the need for long-term sustainability of these community-based SDG projects. For these 10 projects, we allocated some funds for capacity building which will be undertaken in early 2024.

The community farms are the new initiative. Between 2020 and 2022, we had already funded 53 community farms. When MoF invited us to undertake the additional RM10 million, we invited a core group of solution providers who ran successful community farms to become our nucleus. The core group of 20 solution providers met on 27 and 28 May 2023 and gave us valuable advice in writing our RM10 million project proposal. We recruited a new team of staff who managed to publicise the grant well and identified more than the targeted number of projects.

In this report, there are more details on the solution providers and their projects. These projects address social, economic and environmental concerns. They are all community-based and undertaken by local solution providers, benefiting the local people. The due diligence in providing the grants, the regular online monitoring, the field visits to the projects and the external social impact assessment team have now developed an effective model for building the capacity of local communities and solution providers to undertake effective micro-solution projects with the strong participation of local people.

Trend 7: Emergence of a social movement of solution providers and beneficiaries

When we first started in 2020, most of our CSO-NGO partners were in the Klang Valley. As we identified parliamentary locations across the country, we had to identify and recruit other partners especially those in rural areas, in other cities and towns.

Currently, there are 523 solution providers throughout the 85 parliamentary constituencies. There is a detailed breakdown of them in this report. It is important to state that they are the SDG actors on the ground. They reside close to the people and they undertake a hand holding process in service delivery. Our solutions monitoring team is in close contact with all of them.

On 19 June 2023, KSI hosted the SDG Awards for private sector and voluntary sector during the 2nd Malaysian Sustainability Leadership Summit. Ten of our solution providers were shortlisted for the SDG Awards. It is a recognition of the SDG solution projects undertaken to address economic, social and environmental concerns. At the KSI event, we launched two books - one on best practices in solution projects as well as the independent evaluation report by Persatuan Sains Sosial Malaysia (PSSM).

On 17 December 2023, we launched the National Solution Providers Network (SOLSNET) during the Central region solution providers capacity building programme. This network will serve as a platform to coordinate and empower the solution providers into a more effective network. We are exploring the possibility of establishing a cooperative to undertake the marketing and sales of the produce by solution providers especially handicrafts, tailoring and printing work. There are also suggestions to open a SDG Shop.

We also recognise the potential of solution providers with their beneficiaries if we mobilise the 523 grassroots actors and their 10 to 15 beneficiaries. If we also include their family members, the reach ranges between 5,230 to 7,845 people. We are then a sizable social movement of people at the grassroots. Therefore for 2024, we are taking on the theme of Building Resilience: From Beneficiaries to SDG Champions. We really want the grassroots to move beyond dependency and handouts towards greater resilience, empowerment and sustainability.

Trend 8: Thematic emphasis on building inclusive communities

In late 2021, we developed a trainer's module on Building Inclusive Communities (BIC) and pilot tested it in three locations. By early 2022, the UNDP, who funded this project, published the trainer's module.

On 6 and 7 May 2023, we organised a Training of Trainers (ToT) session and invited solution providers to this training. We found that solution providers were based in local communities where they undertook the SDG micro-solution projects and were in close contact with the grassroots. By encouraging them to take on the BIC training, they could impact the grassroots communities at the local level through the BIC theme of appreciating diversity and fostering an inclusive mindset based on the SDGs.

In 2023, two social providers, one in Penang and another in Kuantan organised BIC workshops. We recognised this potential and in 2024, we will intensify the outreach.

At the national level, there is a lot of polarisation based on race and religion. BIC could be an alternative narrative of building inclusive communities and ensuring no one is left behind. We see the possibility of establishing adult learning centres where citizen's literacy on nation building and Federal Constitution civic matters can be organised for local ground leaders.

Trend 9: Strengthening the Secretariat

When we started in 2020, there were only two full-time staff employed in the Secretariat and all others served as volunteers from CSO-NGOs and universities. However, by 2023, due to the high work load and deliverables, the Secretariat is now fully managed by a team of over 35 full-time staff, with others as consultants and resource persons. They all devote their time and energy for the localising of SDGs. We operate from rented premises at 8 Avenue, Petaling Jaya.

We are guided by the yearly approved budget to which the Secretariat develops a Framework and Targets document to ensure all deliverables are undertaken by the deadline. This is an important annual document that now guides delivery.

The supervision and guidance are undertaken by the Head of Secretariat (HoS), Senior Director, three directors (Finance, Constituency and MySDG Academy) and three consultants (Research, Sabah and Sarawak). Some of these positions and designations took effect on 1 June 2023 especially to strengthen the Secretariat leadership with more delegated powers and duties from the HoS, who had previously directly supervised all sections and all staff were reporting to the HoS.

All financial decisions are made by the APPGM-SDG Committee and on a day-to-day basis, it is the Finance Department that does the review and preparation of payments. Three members of the Society for the Promotion of SDGs are involved as cheques and financial documentations are signed by three persons – President, Secretary and Treasurer. Different persons are involved in online banking matters - the maker, checker, and final button to approve. Our accounts are externally audited since 2021 and the auditor's note is included in the annual reports.

The Society for the Promotion of SDGs plays a custodian role in the localising of SDGs as well as an oversight role in its capacity as the legal entity for the APPGM-SDG Secretariat since Jan 2020. All the founding members of the Society still hold office and remain active members. Many serve as resource persons in the Secretariat. To strengthen this aspect as custodian and oversight, we invited two prominent Malaysians on 28 August 2023 to become advisors to the Society. The Society's ROS Constitution has a provision for such an appointment. On 26 September 2023, the Secretariat met up with both advisors, namely Dato' Sri Mustapa Mohamed (former Minister of Economy) and Dato' Sri Hajah Rohani Abdul Karim, (former Chair of APPGM-SDG) to discuss roles and potential areas of involvement.

Trend 10: Networking with four global parliamentary networks

The Head of Secretariat (HoS) participated at the SDG Action workshop on 16-17 September 2023 and related side events at the SDG Summit on 18-19 September 2023 at the UN HQ in New York. During this period, Prof Datuk Dr Dension Jayasooria participated and got in contact with four global parliamentary groups working on SDGs.

The four global parliamentary groups responsible for mobilising MPs in SDGs are:-

• The Inter-Parliamentary Union (IPU)

The Inter-Parliamentary Union (IPU) is an international organisation that serves as a forum for parliamentary dialogue and cooperation. Many Malaysian MPs are actively involved, aligning with the IPU's call for heightened parliamentary participation in advancing the SDGs.



• The Commonwealth Parliamentary Association (CPA)

The Commonwealth Parliamentary Association (CPA) is an organisation that brings together parliamentarians from across the Commonwealth nations. CPA started a new academy with courses for parliamentarians and Malaysian MPs are actively engaged in CPA.



Parliamentarians for the Global Goals (PfGG)

A dynamic global network anchored by the All-Party Parliamentary Group on the Sustainable Development Goals headquartered in Denmark. PfGG serves as a collaborative platform uniting parliamentarians worldwide in the pursuit of sustainable and inclusive development.



Parliamentarians for Global Action (PGA)

Parliamentarians for Global Action (PGA) is a global network of legislators that focuses on advancing international cooperation through parliamentary diplomacy. Prof. Datuk Dr. Denison Jayasooria met with Ms Jennifer McCarthy, the Deputy Secretary-General. She expressed eagerness to collaborate and will invite APPGM-SDG to different conferences and programmes in the future.




These four groups have been playing a key role in linking MPs with the UN on SDGs. Malaysian MPs must become active and visible in these organisations to share best practices from Malaysia as well as be involved in global advocacy for the many issues Malaysia champions at the global stage. For this role, MoF must allocate more funds for MPs' participation in SDG forums at the global arena especially at the United Nations. The APPGM -SDG Committee members and Secretariat met the Parliament Speaker on 29 November 2023 to discuss the role of MPs at the global stage and requested for funding for this purpose. The Speaker agreed to review the current resources for MPs' participation in global meetings and will consider, if there is a need to raise this matter with MoF.

Framework and Targets for 2023



In November 2022, the APPGM-SDG Secretariat released a 2023 Framework and Targets document as guidelines for the 2023 implementation. This document was revised in July 2023. The theme of the year was "Building Inclusive Communities in Ensuring that No One is Left Behind."





MAPPING LOCAL ISSUES & SITUATIONAL ANALYSIS

Methodology in Local Data Gathering and Analysis

The issue mapping is the initiation of the APPGM-SDG's localisation process. The exercise first begins with an engagement with the Member of Parliament (MP) for the constituency. The MP is invited to provide an overview of the constituency, in terms of population size, topography, and the social, economic and environmental issues that the communities may be encountering. Then, the APPGM-SDG's constituency coordinating team will make a visit to the district office, to introduce the APPGM-SDG's localising agenda and receive feedback from the district offices. With the feedback and support of coordination from the MP and district office, the team prepares for the three-day fieldwork at the constituency. After the fieldwork, the APPGM-SDG team will have an inter-agency meeting with the district office, to further discuss the issues, and to obtain the officers' opinions, suggestions and recommendations for resolving the issues sustainably.

It is noteworthy that the APPGM-SDG constituency coordinating team and researchers abide by ethical procedures while conducting the focus group discussions. All the focus group discussions are voice recorded with informed verbal consent from the participants. Furthermore, we have also obtained informed consent from the participants for phototaking.

Based on 2022's experiences, we recognise the need for more stakeholder involvement, especially from local government agencies, in the localisation of the SDGs. Therefore, in 2023, we revised our issue mapping process by emphasising the participation of the district offices and local councils. We have also strengthened our engagement with grassroots communities by conducting more focus group discussions during the three-day fieldwork.

The revised issue mapping process involves visiting the district office to meet with the district officers. The APPGM-SDG team interacts directly with the district offices during the visits to introduce the organisation, its bipartisan principle, and the localising process. This proactive approach of engaging with the district offices has proven effective, as the districtlevel officers' participation has increased significantly in the issue mapping process. Their participation has improved our outreach to grassroots communities, as the officers have participated in planning the three-day fieldwork with APPGM-SDG.

APPGM-SDG has also increased the duration of the fieldwork to fully utilise the three days of field visit, conducting focus group discussions with the local communities. The inter-agency meeting was then extended to the fourth day. With these efforts, qualitative data has increased drastically for the 28 parliamentary constituencies visited in 2023 - the documented issues provide a more nuanced understanding of the intricate dynamics of the local contexts.

2023 Mapping Visits

In 2023, APPGM-SDG successfully involved another 28 parliamentary constituencies in localising the SDGs. This success marks another milestone for APPGM-SDG's localisation process and signifies a breakthrough in the localisation methodology. More importantly, it sets a new threshold for APPGM-SDG's multi-stakeholder engagement in building an inclusive society.

The following table acknowledges the efforts of the APPGM-SDG Constituencies Unit Officers in mapping the issues across the 28 parliamentary constituencies for 2023.

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Thematic Issues from Qualitative Findings

The issue mapping process with the 28 parliamentary constituencies and the issues mapped have further saturated our qualitative findings. This means that the issues can be synthesised and categorised into thematic focuses. The following table contains a list of 26 thematic issues that emerged prominently from the 28 parliamentary issue mapping, with similar issues emerging across other constituencies that have been involved in the APPGM-SDG's localising process since 2020.

It is noteworthy that the qualitative findings of the APPGM-SDG's issue mapping document participants' perspectives, opinions, and experiences through their narratives. The participants reside in urban, rural, and even remote areas. They often have poor socioeconomic backgrounds and live at the margin of the country's development. They were represented of single parents, older people, children and youth, minorities, indigenous communities (Orang Asli and Orang Asal), and villagers living in remote areas. Indeed, their narratives are context-specific, and the findings may not be representative if understood in isolation.

Nevertheless, as summarised below, despite the intricate dynamics and contextual nature of the issues, stark similarities have emerged in the findings from the 28 parliamentary constituencies when compared with the issues found in 2020 until 2022.

The similarities are not only within the same district or state; they are shared across other states in the country. For example, the many target groups of the Department of Social Welfare, such as older people and people with disabilities, share their difficulties in accessing the government's support and assistance. They are unaware of the various upskilling programs or employment opportunities the government offers. Many single mothers are unaware of the schemes, subsidies, and entrepreneurship training made available for them to start their own business.

Similarly, fishers across the country, including Sabah and Sarawak, echo their frustrations of trespassing on local and foreign fishers. At the same time, fishers from northern and southern regions face difficulties obtaining licenses.

To demonstrate the dynamism of the issues, besides similarities, the local communities also demonstrate distinctiveness. For instance, during the discussion, participants often remarked that the issues about drug abuse happen everywhere. However, it is interesting to find that there are different drug preferences among those involved.

While the status of "ketum" as an illicit drug remains debatable, participants from the northern region claimed that syabu is a popular drug among those involved, while participants from the eastern region and some parts of Sabah and Sarawak would raise the concern of "pil kuda" among the youths and fishers. Regardless of the differences, most, if not all, participants claimed unanimously that concerted efforts are required between enforcement of the government agencies, schools, parents, communities of the same villages, and the public to address this issue effectively.

Besides the nuances of the findings in reflecting the lived realities across Malaysia, the 26 thematic issues listed in the Table 3.2 demonstrate the intertwined relations across the 17 SDGs. They demonstrate that in localising the SDGs, it is essential to consider that these goals as interrelated.


Progression of one goal would also mean advancement of others and vice versa. When examining these 26 thematic issues closely against the backdrop of the 17 SDGs framework, the findings unravel the underlying structural and systemic causes we must address and resolve to achieve the 17 SDGs by 2030.

We categorise the findings into three major themes - economic, social, and environmental. To show the similarities and saturation of the findings, we not only summarise the issues based on the findings from the 28 parliamentary constituencies in 2023, but we also indicate the parliamentary constituencies that have been involved with the APPGM-SDG's localisation process (2020-2022) to demonstrate the prevalence of the thematic issues across the country.





MySDG Center for Social Inclusion



With the completion of the issue mapping process in 28 parliamentary constituencies, the APPGM-SDG has a more substantial understanding of the social, economic, and environmental issues across 85 parliamentary constituencies. Hence, it is timely for the APPGM-SDG to initiate policy advocacy initiatives with a new department, the MySDG Center for Social Inclusion (MySDG CSI).

MySDG CSI focuses on reviewing, assessing, and analysing the mapped issues derived from the issue mapping process. Then, with the qualitative data as the context, the Center will initiate further discussions with the MPs, Federal and State governments, district offices and local authorities, private sectors, and CSOs. The Center aims to strengthen policy implementation and recommend pragmatic solutions for achieving the Sustainable Development Goals.

As of 2023, the MySDG CSI comprises three members:

- Dr. Teo Sue Ann (Consultant)
- Dr. Teo Lee Ken
- Ms. Debbie Ann Loh

As an initiative, MySDG CSI has engaged with the Ministry of Women, Family and Community Development (KPWKM) and the Ministry of Domestic Trade and Cost of Living (KPDN). The Center has discussed the unresolved issues from the APPGM-SDG issue mapping process with these ministries and is willing to establish partnerships to resolve the issues identified.

SDG MICRO-SOLUTION PROJECTS IMPACTING GRASSROOTS

Review of Solution Projects

The SDG micro-solution projects are identified as the vital element of the localising SDGs commitment at the grassroots level. These solution projects were immediately undertaken after the issues mapping research exercise was completed in the selected parliamentary constituencies. Identified local community in the mapping exercise will be targeted and the projects were undertaken by organisations at the local level with relevant expertise. This is to ensure the sustainability of the solution projects and engagement in the long-term.

Between 2020 and 2023, a total of 664 solution projects excluding community farms were undertaken by 364 solution providers (SPs) benefiting a total of 18,375 beneficiaries. This is an impressive movement of SDG actors at the local level.

Project Phases and SDG Local Grants

The solution project journey is in phases for each parliamentary constituency. This process of handholding, phase by phase, provides the targeted local community with a continuous empowerment process which brings greater impact to the project and long-term sustainability. The project phases are explained below:

PHASE 1 (Parliamentary Funding) The Phase 1 project was initiated in each parliamentary constituency to align with issues identified and prioritised through the issue mapping process. Solution providers will be selected from the locality and required to have the expertise required by the project aim. They also have to comply with deliverables set by APPGM-SDG. The project beneficiaries and the location will be identified by APPGM-SDG and the project needs will be conducted by a local solution partner with a registered organisation and a valid current account.

PHASE 2 (Parliamentary Funding) Phase 2 is a continuation fund given to existing project partners to continue the projects undertaken in Phase 1. The solution providers are required strictly to continue upscaling the Phase 1 project targeting the existing beneficiaries. This Phase 2 continuation ensures additional support to the beneficiaries in terms of training, skills, expertise and equipment supplies.

PHASE 3
(Parliamentary
Funding)

Phase 3 is the funding that was made available by the Ministry of Finance to support projects that were conducted in Phase 1 and Phase 2. For the year 2023, 60 solution projects were undertaken to continue empowering beneficiaries in terms of business development, education as well as environment preservation.

This funding is introduced to our SPs based on the lessons learned from the previous years' projects. The feedback which was constantly recorded through seamless communication by the Secretariat with solution partners and beneficiaries catalysed the idea of the Community Learning Centre (CLC) project. The aim is to set up local learning centres and to conduct capacity building programmes for the locality, at a physical centre built through this project. CLC will be a sustainable centre for local human capital development. The solution partner is required to sustain the place for long-term and present a plan in the proposal.

INCOME GENERATION PROJECTS

Income generation (IG) is a type of project that targets vulnerable communities and seeks to address their economic needs. The project has specific delivery mechanism such as hands-on training, fixed financial and digital entrepreneurship modules, seed money allocated to beneficiaries (within the project fund) and voluntary monitoring of the beneficiaries for 6 months post-completion (co-funding model). This project requires all the fixed deliverables to be completed with an additional long-term hand holding commitment.

SPECIAL GRANT

The special grant is only offered to existing solution partners (SP) who have completed Phase 1, 2 or 3 and has sustainably empowered beneficiaries for the long-term. The project duration will be 12 months followed by 12 months of monitoring and hand holding. The SP will undergo capacity building while executing the project to elevate them as larger grants recipients where they are encouraged to apply for increased funds provided by organisations such as Yayasan Hasanah, MySDG Fund, other donor and funding bodies. Here, APPGM-SDG is creating the pathway for SPs to access a wider ecosystem of funding with confidence.

Project Governance

Project governance structure are among the key indicators that move a project's progress towards success and sustainability. APPGM-SDG solution project governance starts when the proposals are sent in for project application. There is a 5-stage governance structure that each solution partner is required to follow and fulfill.



Stage 1Project Application

The selected organisation at the locality will attend the project application briefing session and will be given information of the overall project delivery commitment and compliance. The organisation are required to submit the application via a proposal template given.

In 2023, APPGM-SDG came up with SDG grants booklet to guide potential partners to apply for the available SDG grants at the parliamentary constituency level. The booklet contains information about type of grants, case studies of sustainable project development and delivery with APPGM-SDG and the project commitment. This guidebook is an important reference to many organisations to be at par with national project grants application mechanism.



Stage 2Reviewing the Proposals

The project application will be reviewed by 2 resource persons who are experts in their field. The review which is recorded in an online document can be viewed by the solution partner so that he or she can provide feedback to the reviews and revise the proposal accordingly. The resource persons role is critical in curating solution projects that maximise the impact at the grassroots.

Apart from resource persons, the proposals will also be reviewed by APPGM-SDG Secretariat project officers, Directors of the Constituency Coordination Department and Finance. This ensures the project application is on par with the localising the SDGs agenda and budgeted based on the briefing given. A list of resource persons involved in the review process are listed in Table 4.1.

Stage 3Approval Process

The project approval will be at the APPGM-SDG Committee level, with a minimum of three Members of Parliament (MPs) present. A proposal brief document that contains information on the projects from the proposals, review feedback from the review document and feedback from the directors. The Committee also makes relevant recommendations to the projects which the solution partners need to acknowledge in their revised proposal. Upon approval, a MOU will be signed and the solution partner will start the project.



Stage 4 Project Monitoring

The key element in project governance is the monthly online project monitoring meetings. These meetings aim to provide updates on the project's progress, highlight the impact, and address any challenges and issues faced in the project. It also serves as a learning platform for the solution partners and in turn, builds the capacity of our partners. These rigorous meetings aim to ensure that the approved projects are well conducted in the local community. Apart from attending meetings, the solution providers are also required to submit monthly narratives and financial reports, and update the project progress in the relevant WhatsApp and Facebook groups.

The sustainability of the projects are always being measured after the projects are complete and how follow-up sessions are conducted. Projects have a mandatory monitoring period that require solution partners to conduct voluntary monitoring and hand holding for beneficiaries. This ensures that the beneficiaries are utilising the skills and the equipment given towards their income generation and development. Post-project impact evaluation are conducted by an independent academic team. This is the final piece in the governance process and this process measures the impact created by the projects for the beneficiaries towards the localising of SDGs agenda.

Solution Projects by Parliamentary Constituency

In 2023, the grants given out for solution projects have exceeded amounts compared to previous years. The status of the projects progress from 2020 to 2023 is presented in Table 4.2.

Some of the 2022 and 2023 solution projects have extended their project completion to 2024. This approach provides flexibility to the solution providers in completing the deliverables listed in the project proposal. This is due to local challenges which are dynamic in nature.

Community solution projects need to be flexible with the timeframe given as this flexibility is required for it to be impactful at the ground level. This timeframe extension has also paved way for better communication building between beneficiaries and the solution providers as well as increased confidence among beneficiaries in the activities undertaken. The 2022 projects are expected to be completed by March 2024 and the 2023 projects are expected to complete by May 2024.

SDG Solution Projects by SDG Themes

The solution projects which were undertaken based on the mapping findings, are categorized as economic, social and environment solution projects.

Economy or income generation projects are the highest in number and this reflects the needs of the vulnerable communities who are in need of income and social protection to survive. This is followed by social projects which mainly focused on education and skills development. There are 37 environment projects which include initiatives such as mangrove replanting, upcycling plastic and glass, waste management and gravity water. Table 4.3 provides the 2023 detailed solution projects undertaken based on the SDG themes, social, economy and environment.




Beneficiaries

SDG Solution Providers and Partners

Organisations that undertake microsolution projects are identified as solution providers. They are the prime movers of the micro-solution agenda at grassroots and contribute towards the SDGs localisation.

Since 2020, the number of local partners has grown impressively from 25 partners in 2020 to 78 partners in 2021. In 2022 and 2023, we saw a significant growth reaching 364 active solution partners undertaking solution projects at the grassroots. They also show a strong dedication towards sustainability. Details in Table 4.6 indicate the type of organisations by their registration type.

Solution Providers' Empowerment Model

Solution providers being the prime movers of the solutions are receive continuous empowerment through capacity building programmes. We implement this based on a 3-tier empowerment model. Solution providers who enter the empowerment ecosystem as grant recipients will be empowered as solution partners and eventually as SDG project owners. This model was published in our book, *SDG Solutions Projects: Best Practices Impacting the Grassroots*, and quoted in many conference papers. The model encapsulates the journey of an organisation towards achieving project success as well as organisational sustainability.

SDG Grant Recipients

Solution Providers (SPs) enter the ecosystem and undergo various capacity building namely proposal writing, SDGs, gender budgeting, impact evaluation framework, empowerment and participatory models and many more. These capacity building series are ongoing programmes conducted by our resource persons and invited experts, both national and international. They will also become a partner of our National Solution Providers Network (SOLSNET) and participate in best practices sharing activities, forums and other peer learning activities.

Solution Partners

In the second stage, the solution providers become Solution Partners. This elevation is anticipated to take place between 1 year to 3 years, depending on the learning capacity and readiness of solution providers towards learning and development. This solution partner level requires a minimum of 3 types of commitment, namely conducting co-funding projects, conducting additional initiatives with APPGM-SDG, and playing a role as a resource person in project proposal reviews, and project monitoring visits as regional coordinators.

In 2023, we have solution partners undertaking 150 income generation co-funding projects, 12 Building Inclusive Communities programmes, and 30 youth camps are being conducted by solution partners. In addition to these, 23 solution partners are involved in proposal reviews and project monitoring visits.

SDG Project Owners

Project owners are partners who have a self-sustaining capacity to conduct projects with the formation of cooperatives and social enterprises. Apart from such self-sustaining models, the project owners are also able to secure larger grants from other agencies such as Yayasan Hasanah, Yayasan MySDG, Yayasan Inovasi, MITRA, CIMB Foundation, Pitch Borneo and others. Apart from that, in 2023, we are also engaging ESG funding from corporate companies to continuously fund our solution projects for the long-term. We already have 4 partners receiving funding from other agencies and we are planning to increase this to at least 50 partners to receive external funding. We are also encouraging more partners to form cooperatives among their beneficiaries and social enterprises and this work is already underway.

Events with Solution Providers

Solution Providers Conference

The empowerment of solution providers is the key ingredient for sustainable impact of solution projects. APPGM-SDG conducted annual solution providers conferences and capacity building programmes. The first national program was conducted in 2022 and for 2023, the program was organised in three regions namely Peninsular Malaysia, Sabah, and Sarawak. This was done to reach a larger pool of solution providers throughout Malaysia.

These programmes were undertaken in November and December 2023 and attended by solution providers together with their beneficiaries. For the first time in 2023, we introduced the participation of beneficiaries in our national training programmes with the aim of empowering them as local champions.

A total of 321 solution partners and beneficiaries participated (Sarawak – 47, Sabah – 87 and Peninsular Malaysia – 187). It was a remarkable gathering where both solution partners and beneficiaries shared their heart-moving impact and we noted a tremendous movement in social mobility among the beneficiaries.









Capacity Building

Capacity building programmes includes presentations and workshops on APPGM-SDG solution frameworks such as solution providers' empowerment model, community building participatory model, impact evaluation framework, sharing on social enterprises and cooperatives, sharing from agencies handling social capital development, and more importantly feedback from solution partners and beneficiaries. The peer learning that was undertaken through project knowledge sharing in WhatsApp and Facebook groups as well as the monthly presentations enabled growth among solution partners. This was reflected in these sessions and their sharings.













UDHR 75th Anniversary

Human Rights is a foundational framework for the SDGs. The solution partners were introduced to the Universal Declaration of Human Rights (UDHR) in an event to commemorate the 75th anniversary of the UDHR which was held on 10 December 2023.

KSI SDG Icon Leadership Award 2023

KSI hosted the 2nd Malaysian Sustainability Leadership Summit entitled "Advancing Sustainability, Enhancing Public-Private-People Partnership" held on 19 June 2023 at Berjaya Times Square Hotel, Kuala Lumpur.

At this summit, KSI awarded the SDG Icon Leadership Awards to 10 grassroot SDG champions for undertaking impactful SDG-related projects at the grassroots especially among vulnerable communities.



Community Programmes

Building Inclusive Communities 2023

The Building Inclusive Communities (BIC) Programme is aimed at mainstreaming values of social cohesion such as diversity and inclusion in everyday life through government and civil society activities. Two BIC programmes were carried out in 2023 by the Solution Team in Perai, Penang and Kuantan, Pahang.

On 26 November 2023, 22 participants, most of whom were Solution Partners from the North Region, came together to implement the BIC programme for a day. This group's involvement highlights our network's common goal of working together to implement community-focused projects that have a significant impact in Perai, Penang. The trainers involved in this initiative are among the solution partners who were trained as BIC trainers by APPGM-SDG. These include Mr. Nawawi from Ourizq Enterprise, Ms. Farhana from Ana CB Enterprise, and Mr. Asrul Effendi bin Abdul Murad from Yakin Kerjaya Sdn Bhd (YKP College) were some of these trainers.

The BIC in Kuantan, Pahang conducted on 20 December 2023 had a total of 43 participants. The participants were are all solution partners involved in our Community Garden project in Pahang. The success of this programme is attributed to the trainers, namely Ms. Sridayu Samsuri from the Kuantan Inspirational Women's Association and Mr. Fakhrul Anuar Zulkawi from KP MULTI SERVICES (Kuantan Prihatin). Their valuable contributions and expertise played a pivotal role in ensuring the effectiveness of the programme.



Youth Camp Capacity Building Training

On 18 and 19 November 2023, 24 solution partners took part in the Youth Camp Training of Trainers (ToT) programme that APPGM-SDG arranged for solution partners. Participants in this event were assigned to run 30 camps with camp participants ranging from ages 19 to 35, at their respective locations. The intention was to enable young people to form their youth organisations, encouraging youth leadership and community involvement.

The Youth Camp training was led by eight trainers from APPGM-SDG. The topics covered included the participants' role as Malaysians, encouraging respect for diversity, team building, exploring alternate ways for youth education, celebrating multiculturalism, exploring leadership and motivation, teaching about the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs), and highlighting the value of community service. We have decided that 30 Youth Camps will be conducted around Malaysia in 2024, together with the trainers.





Neighbourhood Programme Launch

The neighbourhood programme is a unique programme to identify and create another layer of local leadership apart from solution providers. The launch of this programme was done in Flat PKNS Taman Dato Harun, Petaling Jaya, and the event was graced by the MP of Petaling Jaya, Hon. Lee Chean Chung.

The programme targets local leaders such as KRTs, resident associations, village heads, JPKK, and informal leaders as local SDG champions in in grassroots communities. The neighbourhood programme consists of 5 sub-programmes in 50 locations. Each programme targets the local with communities modules such as neighbourhood profiling, SDG capacity building, economic development via self-help groups, family institution development, and women, youth, and children development. We aim to conduct 50 neighbourhood programmes in 2024.





Impact Evaluation Cohort 2022

Impact evaluation is an important component of localising the SDGs in Malaysia. In 2023, the SDG-Impact Evaluation (IE) team under the leadership of Persatuan Sains Sosial Malaysia (PSSM) undertook the task of evaluating 193 projects.

PSSM worked with academia from 15 universities comprising 51 evaluators. The evaluators are from 10 public universities and 5 private universities.

The objectives of this evaluation exercise are to analyse the impacts of the solution projects from the perspective of beneficiaries; to identify main achievements and challenges faced by the solution providers and beneficiaries based on the project outcomes, and to suggest some recommendations for future projects.

In 2023, the work of the SDG-IE team comprised two major tasks; **Task 1: Finalising the SDG-IE Report 2022**, and **Task 2: Preparation for SDG-IE of 2023 projects**.

Task 1: Finalising the SDG-IE Report 2022

The framework of SDG-IE has 6 impact domains: deep, clear, wide, high, gender and SDG sustainability. From SDG-IE Report 2022, findings revealed that beneficiaries indicated that the two most impactful domains were Deep (personal) and Clear (skills). With Deep Impact, beneficiaries stated that they gained self-confidence as agents of change with new knowledge about SDGs and the specific knowledge imparted to them by solution providers.

In the second domain, skills acquired by the beneficiaries especially in organic farming, electrical know-how and online marketing provided them with the ability to generate income. Examples of income generation projects are chili fertigation in Hulu Rajang, Sarawak, Organic Mushroom Farming in Jeli, Kelantan, and a Bakery in Selayang, Selangor. A total of 50 projects out of 87 projects (57 %) are income-generating projects. The other 4 areas of impact are the formation of networks (Wide Impact), creation of a system (High Impact), understanding SDGs (SDGs) Impact and Gender Awareness (Gender Impact).

Among these domains, the least impactful is the creation of a certain system or SOP. However, from focus group discussions, beneficiaries did indicate that they put certain processes in place, for example in the farming method of chili fertigation. They may not recognise it as a High (System) impact. The Gender dimension is more apparent within the implementation stage by solution providers. They took into account the accessibility of projects activities to both women and men, and the needs at the project sites. In fact, the Gender domain is prevalent and in line with policy issues relating to women. It is also emerges as a strong theme in the issue mapping process.

Task 2: Preparation for SDG-Impact Evaluation of 2023 Projects

For 2023, due to the increase in the number of projects to evaluate across the six regions, the number of evaluators increased to 50 persons comprising of 10 teams; 4 teams in Sabah and Sarawak, and 6 teams in Peninsular Malaysia. It was important to ensure that all team members were well-grounded in the IE framework, the processes document review, focus group discussions (FGDs), and report writing.

The APPGM-SDG Inception Meeting/Workshop took place at Hotel Maluri Cheras, Kuala Lumpur, from 3 - 5 November 2023. The workshop aimed to familiarise the 45 evaluators with the methodology and overall processes involved in impact evaluation. The module for the SDG-IE team focused on 6 domains which are deep, clear, wide, high, gender and SDG sustainability indicator domains, for evaluation with the beneficiaries. Using both qualitative and quantitative approaches, the team also chose 65 projects for FGDs. The flow chart of the IE process is illustrated below.



Site visits were also part of the Term of Reference for the evaluators. By December 2023, the evaluators completed document review of all projects. They have also initiated FGDs where 45% of 65 project beneficiaries were interviewed. Evaluators also completed writing their individual reports of each projects.

As of 31 December 2023, the team still has substantial work to be completed in the first four months of 2024.



From Global to Local: Sharing Experiences and Impacts in Localising Solutions in Malaysia. Edited by Rashila Ramli and Sity Daud of PSSM

This book is reports the evaluation of the 2020 solution projects. The evaluation is undertaken to measure the impact using a three-step approach namely the impact identification, impact verification and impact validation. A total of 15 evaluators from local universities reviewed all the paper documentation and visited selected field sites.

The report was launch on 19 June 2023 at a KSI event.

Lessons Learned

Lesson 1 We saw greater participation and ownership of our solution partners in localising the SDGs and undertaking local solutions.

Lesson 2 We saw a greater movement in the social mobility of our beneficiaries, with greater confidence and resilience evident through the many testimonies shared.

Lesson 3 Increased awareness of understanding the SDGs and their application in addressing local issues.

Lesson 4 Solution partners have become resource persons and conduct cross-visits to other regions to monitor projects and transfer knowledge and expertise. This has resulted in amazing partnerships built among the solution partners attributed to the regular monitoring meetings.

Lesson 5 As a result of regular monitoring and hand holding sessions, we have witnessed how the projects have sustained and progressed with minimal attrition. It is evident that with regular monitoring, relationship and trust building, our local partners record that 95% of the projects are actively going on the ground.

Lesson 6 We note that each community is unique, and understanding the local context is crucial. Factors such as culture, history, and existing social structures play a significant role. Therefore, each context in a community needs a unique approach to fit the specific needs and dynamics of the community.

Lesson 7 We emphasise that empowerment of local leaders within the community is key. They understand the community's dynamics, and their involvement can enhance the effectiveness and sustainability of community development initiatives.

Lesson 8 Our theme for 2023, Building Inclusive Communities has become the mantra in ensuring that our engagement efforts are inclusive and respect diversity. Our partners have taken the extra step and effort to include marginalised or underrepresented groups in decision-making processes in their respective projects.

COMMUNITY FARMING

Review of Community Farming

In 2023, the Ministry of Finance, Malaysia entrusted All-Party Parliamentary Group Malaysia (APPGM-SDG) with the mammoth task of undertaking the community farming project. This initiative is an engagement between APPGM-SDG and grassroots communities in efforts to address food security concerns. These initiatives are typically driven by grassroots who receive support from local communities, social enterprises, voluntary organisations and local universities.

We have dispersed funds to local communities to undertake community farming. These are in the form of micro-grants of below RM40,000.00 per project. We are also undertaking monitoring to ensure social impact and will undertake an evaluation by an external partner after the completion of the project.





Importance of Community Farming

Community farming projects are important for communities to grow their produce sustainably while improving both dietary quality and health, towards addressing food insecurity. Community farming projects provide many social benefits including increased opportunities for community engagement and fostering interactions among diverse communities, besides providing environmental benefits. Additionally, community farming plays an important role in the economy, for example, reduced grocery expenses with harvest gained from community gardens and farms. Community farming also provides local employment opportunities and may contribute towards increasing the income of communities.

Basic Data on the 2023 Community Farming Initiatives

The community farming initiative marked a **Table 5.1:** Community Farming projects by region in 2023 significant milestone by achieving a total of 198 projects involving a total of 2,153 participants from various backgrounds. We were able to accelerate the expansion of community farms in 2023 as we already had gained experience in giving out community grants to 53 community farming projects between 2020 and 2022, that is, 5 projects in 2020, 17 projects in 2021, and 31 projects in 2022. This foundation allowed us to expand to another 198 community farming projects.

These 198 projects launched in 2023 are in 101 parliamentary constituencies Malaysia. These are divided into 6 regions for effective monitoring (Table 5.1).

Types of Community Farming Projects

These Community Farming projects encompass various farming and livestock rearing activities. The projects are divided into 11 types of farming based on the nature of their activities. These types of farming include modern farming, animal breeding and feed, mushroom farming, organic farming, food forest, conventional farming, rice cultivation, seed bank, herbal farming, integrated farming and compost production as indicated in Table 5.2.



Community Farming Roadshows and Visits

Community Farming Roadshows

The aim of the roadshow is to encourage community engagement in farming and livestock activities, producing their own food and generating income through the sale of their produce. The Community Farming Initiative grant was promoted to all regions such as South, North, East, Sabah and Sarawak. In addition, the community farming team organised meetings with Members of Parliament to share and publicise this grant to communities in their respective parliamentary constituencies. The team also promoted this grant by advertising brochures through social media such as Facebook, Instagram, TikTok and WhatsApp. Participants who joined the roadshow briefings consisted of KRT committees, cooperatives, institutions, associations, NGOs, SSM and other organisations. The community farming conducted a total of 10 roadshows throughout Malaysia as follows:

Community Farming Project Visits

The project visits aimed to find out about project development, project management, project issues and problems as well as to see the harvest obtained by Solution Providers and the participants. Project visits for the year 2023 started in November because most of the Solution Providers started their projects in September 2023. Project visits that were carried out during November and December 2023 covered the Central Region, the East Coast Region and the Southern Region. The team conducted 3 visits to Selangor, 1 visit to Melaka and 6 visits to Pahang (Table 5.4). In 2023, the community farming team visited 10 projects such as modern farming, animal breeding, organic farming and conventional farming. However, more site visits will be conducted in 2024 to ensure that the projects are steadily progressing as stated by the solution providers in their monthly reports and presentations.

The site visits have increased the community farming team's knowledge in organic and conventional agriculture, soil conservation methods, pest control, organic livestock management, animal nutrition and diet management amongst others. Through capacity building, Solution Providers and participants have grown in their knowledge of agriculture or animal husbandry.




Community Farming Projects - Governance

Undertaking 198 community farming projects in partnership with 198 solution providers required a strategic governance structure in application processing and review, project execution and finally, project monitoring. This is vital to ensure that all the processes involved are properly executed according to the stipulated standards and monitored well for impactful delivery. Diagram 5.1 presents the implementation and project approval governance structure.

The process begins with the promotion of the Community Farming grant through roadshows, briefings, and external engagements to attract proposals. Upon submission, proposals undergo rigorous internal and external review, with feedback provided to enhance their quality. Subsequently, the proposals undergo approval by the APPGM-SDG Committee. Upon approval, a MOU agreement is prepared and signed, marking the commencement of the project. Monthly monitoring is then conducted to track the projects' progress effectively and ensure that all processes are executed according to standards and the stipulated timeframe.

Proposal Review

The review committee comprises of 12 resource persons (Table 5.5) who play a crucial role in the proposal development process. The focus of the reviews is to understand the objectives, deliverables and expected outcomes of the proposed projects. Each proposal undergoes evaluation by two resource persons, ensuring a comprehensive assessment. Their reviews provide valuable recommendations to enhance the impact of the solution providers' project proposals (Diagram 5.2).

Diagram 5.2: Proposal review process





Project Approval Cycle

Community Farming Monthly Online Monitoring Meetings

Monthly monitoring meetings are an important element in project monitoring reflecting the commitment of solution providers to meet up with the APPGM-SDG team every month for online discussions and updates. This is a cross-learning platform created for solution providers to share their innovations, lessons learned, challenges and solutions. There is a wealth of knowledge that is being shared among solution providers from different locations.

This monthly monitoring meeting is also attended by the Director of the Constituency Coordination Department and independent researchers undertaking impact evaluation, thereby strengthening project governance. We also share our emphasis on the SDG impact we wish to see among the grassroots communities.



Ipoh Model Farm

Ipoh Model Farm is a modern farming implementation started in July 2023 in Kampung Tai Lee, Silibin Avenue Ipoh, Perak on a one-acre land. It is a model of collaboration between the APPGM-SDG, the Ipoh City Council (MBI), the Member of Parliament for Ipoh Barat, and the local community or residents of Kampung Tai Lee and Jalan Spooner in Ipoh Barat.

Participatory activities include commercial fertigation, training for local communities on modern agriculture, introduction to sustainable supply chains, and marketing products that will benefit local communities from both the abovementioned places. In addition, this model farm will serve as an agricultural training ground for other farmers.

On 19 May 2023, the APPGM-SDG Secretariat held a meeting to discuss the issues identified during the issue mapping of Kampung Tai Lee and Jalan Spooner in Ipoh Barat with the Member of Parliament for Ipoh Barat, Hon. M. Kulasegaran, Datuk Bandar Ipoh, Datuk Rumaizi Baharin and officials from the Ipoh City Council (MBI). As a result of the issue mapping, the three parties agreed to use the land leased to Persatuan Sahabat Cinta Alam Malaysia (PSCAM) for the purpose of the urban community garden project.

On 25 May 2023, APPGM-SDG together with Hon. M. Kulasegaran held a meeting with the residents of Kampung Tai Lee to explain the community garden project and how it would benefit them. They agreed to work with both parties to make this project a success, but they shared their concerns that they could not do traditional farming due to their age and health reasons. The APPGM-SDG agreed to discuss this matter before starting the project.

On 16 September 2023, APPGM-SDG, and the Member of Parliament for Ipoh Barat, YB Tuan M. Kulasegaran held a meeting to sign an agreement for this community garden project for a period of one year, starting on 16 September 2023. This agreement was signed by representatives from Persatuan Promosi Matlamat Pembangunan Lestari (PPMPL) and Persatuan Sahabat Cinta Alam Malaysia (PSCAM) and will be renewed after one year.

As agreed, APPGM-SDG overcame the challenges of age and health factors by appointing a solution provider to carry out this project. This involved two full-time workers who would stay at the farm. Traditional agriculture was converted to polybag fertigation as a solution to the concerns raised. The project will be supervised by an APPGM-SDG staff based in Ipoh, Perak.

The nursery construction and farm infrastructure work are in-progress. The community will be given the opportunity to participate in the seed planting program and the transfer of chili seedlings to polybags. The community will be monitoring the development and growth of chili. Some of the harvest will be given to residents and some will be sold to wholesalers, and the income obtained from the sale will be given to the residents involved in this project.











Challenges Experienced in Community Farming

There are various challenges in community farming. The most common challenge is experienced during the planning stage and finding a location to start the farming project. This is because the person-in-charge needs to choose a suitable location to start their project according to their crops and the accessibility of the location for the participants.

In addition, climate change poses formidable challenges to the farming project. Firstly, the erratic weather patterns including droughts, floods, storms, and heatwaves, affect crop yields and disrupt farming schedules. Most of the time, crop damage happens due to high temperatures. Moreover, warmer temperatures and precipitation alterations foster ideal conditions for pests and diseases, escalating their prevalence and necessitating costly management strategies.

Among the other challenges are lack of farming and agricultural knowledge. The lack of knowledge in farming affects the farm management, soil management, post-harvest management and poses challenges in pest and disease management. Pests need to be controlled naturally by using organic insecticides, fungicides and weeds can be controlled by using herbicides.

Other than that, the lack of participation of the project participants has also been one of the challenges faced by the community. This is although all the participants have to commit themselves to complete the project.

Lessons Learned

In embarking on community farming projects at the grassroots, the journey has provided invaluable lessons that underscore the significance of localised engagement:

- **Lesson 1** *Community engagement is key:* Effective community involvement and participation are critical for the success of farming projects. Building strong relationships, listening to community needs and involving members in decision-making enhance project buy-in and sustainability. In this context, building community trust is key.
- **Lesson 2** *Adaptability and flexibility:* Community farming projects often encounter unforeseen challenges such as changing weather patterns or fluctuations in market dynamics. The ability to adapt and adjust strategies in response to these challenges is crucial for resilience and success.
- **Lesson 3** *Knowledge sharing and training:* Investing in education and training programmes for community members builds capacity and empowers farmers with the skills needed for sustainable agriculture. Continuous knowledge sharing contributes to improved farming practices and increased yields.
- **Lesson 4** *Sustainable practices yield long-term benefits:* Embracing sustainable farming practices, such as organic cultivation, agroforestry and water conservation, not only benefits the environment but also leads to long-term economic and social advantages for the community.
- **Lesson 5** *Market access and diversification:* Connecting community farmers to markets and encouraging crop diversification helps create economic opportunities. Understanding market trends and demands enables farmers to make informed decisions and enhances overall project viability.
- **Lesson 6** *Technology integration:* Incorporating modern agricultural technologies, such as Internet of Things (IoT) can optimise resource use and improve productivity. However, it is crucial to ensure that technology adoption aligns with the community's capacity and resources.
- **Lesson 7** *Community resilience building:* Building resilience within the community involves addressing both economic and environmental aspects. Creating diversified income streams and implementing risk mitigation strategies contribute to the overall resilience of the community.
- **Lesson 8** *Partnerships and collaborations:* Collaborating with local organisations, government agencies, and non-profits enhances the project's impact. Shared resources, expertise, and networks can address challenges more effectively and promote sustainable development.
- **Lesson 9** *Monitoring and evaluation:* Implementing robust monitoring and evaluation systems helps track project progress, identify challenges early, and make informed decisions. Regular assessments enable the project team to adapt and restrategise to ensure ongoing success.
- **Lesson 10** *Celebrating successes and learning from failures:* Recognising and celebrating achievements, no matter how small, boosts morale and encourages continued community participation. Additionally, learning from setbacks and failures provides valuable insights for adjustments and future improvements.

Communications

We are committed to producing reports, publications, documentaries and updates on the progress of APPGM-SDG through various channels such as social media, print media and video content.

SDG Localisation Capacity Building Workshops and Conferences

In 2023, MySDG Academy coordinated capacity building workshops in the constituencies covered throughout the year. A total of 28 Localising SDGs workshops were conducted with the support of Member of Parliaments, district offices and local strategic partners.

The capacity building trainings were conducted according to the framework of the Localising SDGs Module that included 4 parts. **Part 1**, a comprehensive introduction to the SDGs encompassing background, themes, goals and targets. Interactive activities were conducted to map participants' own experiences of these goals, to gain a clear understanding of the targets and indicators, along with a community-based approach.

Part 2 focuses on the localisation of the SDGs in Malaysia based on the approach carried out by the APPGM-SDG, through group activities, focusing on issue mapping and prioritisation of issues. **Part 3** encourages participants to suggest solutions for local issues with an emphasis on SDG 17 (Partnerships for the Goals), as well as discuss impact assessments and implementation strategies. The workshop concludes with **Part 4**, a reflective session, where participants will identify the main themes learned, future action plans and suggestions for future workshops.

Overall, the workshops aimed to localise the SDGs in Malaysia, highlighting the APPGM-SDG approach. Through collaborative activities, participants actively engaged in issue mapping and proposed solutions, with a strong focus on SDG 17. In 2023, a total of **1,088 participants** from different states took part in the one-day localisation workshop (Table 6.1).

MySDG Conferences 2023: Building Inclusive Communities

In 2023, MySDG Academy organised a series of three conferences with the support of Persatuan Sains Sosial Malaysia (PSSM), Malaysian CSO-SDG Alliance, and the Institute for Development Studies (IDS), Sabah. The 3 conferences led up to the 2024 MySDG International Conference. A total of 146 community leaders, academics and researchers presented various local stories, case studies, empirical research findings and commentaries.

The inaugural conference took place in September 2023 in Kuching, where 45 participants gathered to share their insights. A total of 20 papers were presented. Subsequently, the city of Kota Kinabalu hosted the second conference on 14 and 15 October 2023, witnessing a larger gathering of 85 participants who contributed 33 papers. The final conference in the series took place in Kota Bharu on 28 and 29 October 2023 with 36 participants and 21 papers.

Central to this series of proceedings were the keynote papers by Prof. Datuk Dr. Denison Jayasooria where he highlighted three foundational principles for building inclusive communities. His scholarly contributions not only framed our understanding but also charted the course for future discourse and action. These conferences collectively fostered knowledge exchange, collaboration and a shared commitment to advancing sustainable development in Malaysia and beyond.









Partnership Building Workshops

Partnership building workshops were coordinated by MySDG Academy with the aim of fostering collaborative relationships with civil societies, government agencies, and academia in order to activate these moving force of the SDGs.

ESG Awareness

Various topics were discussed and shared throughout the year in the sessions. These include social cohesion, public policies, multidimensional poverty and the redefinition of the development approach, equality of women, discussion on the life worth living, peace, justice and strong institutions, and digital movement in community transformation. The highlights are recorded below.

















INTAN Partnership

The collaboration between MySDG Academy and INTAN aims to enhance awareness and build the capacity of civil officers regarding the localising of SDGs. This strategic partnership focuses on implementing training programmes for civil servants across six regions. Through this initiative, we empower public servants to contribute effectively to sustainable development, aligning their work with the global SDG agenda. By fostering knowledge exchange and skill development, we strive to create a more resilient and responsible public service workforce.

The Secretariat attended a meeting with the cohort of State Secretaries, organised by INTAN to discuss ongoing work and explore partnership opportunities for the capacity building programmes aimed at empowering civil officers. Youth Empowerment in SDG Localisation

The Youth Development arm has been actively advancing its localisation agenda for the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) since 2021.

Through a series of strategic initiatives, this unit engages and mobilises Malaysian youth, equipping them with the necessary skills, resources and networks to actively participate in SDG localisation efforts.

Key initiatives include: Young Politicians Workshop, Malaysian Youth SDG Summit, Malaysian Youth SDG Agents, Youth in SDG research and international involvement.

Young Politicians Workshop

The Young Politicians workshop is an initiative that gathers youths active in political organisations to learn about the SDGs and integrate sustainability elements into their political venture. The initiative was launched following the advice of APPGM-SDG Chair, Hon. Isnaraissah Munirah Majilis. MySDG Academy has since undertaken the project to train youths with political backgrounds on the SDGs, leadership and partnership, with a focus on SDG 16 - Peace, Justice and Strong Institutions.

In 2023, the 1st Young Politicians Workshop held was titled as "Bengkel Mengintegrasi SDG dalam Politik." Youths aged below 40 years from various political parties attended to learn about this topic at Pulau Langkawi.

Malaysian Youth SDG Summit 2023

The Malaysian Youth SDG Summit 2023 was held on 9 September 2023 at the International Youth Centre, Cheras. This summit was a gathering that spotlighted the often overlooked narratives of Malaysia's marginalised communities. From the vibrant Orang Asli community to the inspiring deaf drum players, from the resilient refugees to the vast youth population, their stories echoed the urgent need for youth-driven interventions. The summit also emphasised the need for a shift from mere tolerance to genuine acceptance, urging the youth to rewrite cultural narratives and actively participate in shaping democratic processes.



Malaysian Youth SDG Agents

The Malaysian Youth SDG Agents platform is a revolutionary initiative launched in 2022 to help young people connect with their local community and parliamentarians to take action with SDG lenses on inclusive and equitable societies.

From 7 to 10 September 2023, youths gathered from across Malaysia to learn about the SDGs and pitch their ideas to be implemented as micro-projects. Three teams were awarded the Belia Juara Grant of RM9,000 each, thanks to the joint contribution of RM 4,000 from Selangor Youth Community (SAY) and RM 5,000 from APPGM-SDG. The teams undertook the initiative and implemented projects in Sabah, Penang and Selangor on Entrepreneurship, Food Security, and Cultural Preservation Advocacy, respectively.







Youth in SDG Research

In 2023, the youth development arm authored 3 research articles that focused on youth mobilisation for the SDGs. The articles were written using data from the youth development unit.

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FINANCE AND ADMINISTRATION

Review of Financial Governance

Funding

Funding for the Localising SDGs programmes at Parliamentary Constituencies has been allocated by the Ministry of Finance (MoF) through the Parliament of Malaysia for APPGM-SDG activities from 2020 till 2023. MoF has confirmed funding for our 2024 activities. We record our thanks to MoF for the great trust placed in our hands. All funding is channelled through Persatuan Promosi Matlamat Pembangunan Lestari (PPMPL), the Secretariat to the APPGM-SDG.

The Budget Allocation for 2023 grew by an impressive 100% to RM20 million, compared to RM10 million in 2022. This jump is comparable to the growth in Budget Allocation, from RM 2 million in 2020 to RM 5 million in 2021, respectively.

The number of SDG micro-solution projects attributed to the Localising SDGs programmes has grown from 34 projects in 2020, to 87 in 2021. This grew to 197 in 2022, with the final count for 2023 being a massive 343 projects.

For 2023, in addition to the existing Localising SDGs project, MoF had also allocated an additional RM10 million to APPGM-SDG to set up the operations and execution of the *Kebun Komuniti* (Community Farming) programme. Although the green light was received from MoF only in June 2023, this program was fast-tracked and by the end of the year, it has eventually led to the set-up of a model urban farm in Ipoh plus the approval of two hundred (200) *Kebun Komuniti* micro-projects for ground implementation throughout the country.

Staff

With this growth in funding, the Finance Department has had to grow in tandem. We have moved from having just two staff (Director and Executive Officer) to now a team of 4 (four) persons with the inclusion of two (2) Officers. The two (2) new staff are dedicated to receiving and processing finance-related documents, while the Executive Officer has taken over the previous duties of the Director, which includes the entry of all payments into the banking system application. This leaves the Director with more time for budget monitoring and planning.

As part of a restructuring exercise, the Human Resources and Administration functions were handed over to the Director, who is now re-designated as Director of Finance and Administration. An additional two staff have been allocated to assist the Director with this Human Resources and Administration aspect, which will come under a new Administration Unit. The existing three (3) under the Director are now designated as the Finance Unit.

Payroll and Accounting Systems

Swingvy and XERO are the names of the Payroll and Accounting Systems, respectively. Both were implemented on a parallel run basis in October 2022, and went live online from January 2023.

Swingvy handles payroll, staff attendance (clocking in and out), and all forms of leave management online via the mobile phone application or web-based programme. XERO is a cloud-based programme that allows staff to submit their claims online via the mobile phone application or web-based programme.

Good Governance

The Director continues to prepare the Monthly Finance Report which is distributed by the Head of Secretariat Department to Parliament, MoF, Ministry of Economy, and the APPGM-SDG Committee.

Payments processing has now been reduced to an average three (3) days from the previous process which exceeded seven (7) working days. This has been achieved by having the Executive Officer designated as an additional Maker, and the Director has been added as a Checker for the CIMB Bank Account. The responsibility of payment approvals are now shared between the Senior Director of HoS together with the Head of Secretariat. One of the staff that joined in 2023 happens to have worked in an audit firm previously. Her experience has boosted the 2022 Audit process as well as the 2023 pre-Audit exercise.

The implementation of the Payroll and Accounting Systems this year has been timely indeed. Gone are the Excel spreadsheets to control incoming and outgoing expenses, the manual control of leave, and the manual calculation of salaries, EPF and SOCSO.

Bank Accounts

As at the end of 2023, PPMPL has three (3) bank accounts. CIMB 1 is designated to transactions related to Localising SDGs programmes, CIMB 2 in designated to *Kebun Komuniti* programme and any other APPGM-SDG programmes not related to Localising SDGs, while the Maybank account is solely for PPMPL funds.

Major Financial Decisions

All major financial decisions are made by the APPGM-SDG Committee during their regular Committee Meetings with a quorum of 3 Members of Parliament. Among these decisions are the approval of solution projects for both Localising SDGs and *Kebun Komuniti*. We wish to acknowledge the tremendous support given by the APPGM-SDG Committee to both the Localising SDGs and *Kebun Komuniti* Solutions Teams during the final quarter of 2023. Committee meetings were held almost every Friday morning to review all projects proposals to meet our commitment to get all these projects approved before the end of the year.

2024 Projects

The enlarged Finance and Administration Department with its pre-existing Finance Unit and newly established Administration Unit looks forward to the 2024 challenges of managing RM20 million for Localising SDGs, RM10 million for *Kebun Komuniti*, plus another special fund in collaboration with Yayasan Hasanah to provide larger grants to strengthen and upscale our existing Solution Providers.
